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THE HISTORY OF CANVASES

THE USE OF CANVASES - THEN AND NOW

One of the oldest embroidery techniques, widespread since centuries throughout the world, including Asia, Southern Europe, France and England, is known as the "tapestry technique." Tapestry in vivid patterns was often used to cover chairs and sofas, or for large wall hangings, purses and other useful items. Today, many of these gorgeous works can be admired in museums.

A characteristic feature of tapestry is that it is embroidered on canvas. In the process, the canvas is completely covered by embroidery stitches, meaning that both the motif and the background are embroidered on. One can choose a single form of embroidery to do so, but multiple types of embroidery can also be used. This depends on whether one wants to create an regular or irregular texture.

Tapestry has been embroidered on canvas for many centuries, fully covered so that the texture of the canvas is no longer visible.

There are two reasons why tapestry is embroidered on canvas and not on normal, countable fabric: For one thing, canvas is much less expensive than other countable needlework fabrics and for another, it is a very firm mesh thanks to its thick finish. With canvas, the mesh

threads are very far apart in comparison with other fabrics and cannot be shifted. This has the benefit that the fabric will not contract when being embroidered on.

Tapestry is a counted technique, which is why the motifs to be embroidered are counted on the canvas. There are many patterns available on the market: the canvases are usually pre-printed with the pattern and only have to be embroidered over. However, there are also canvases on the market which are already traced out, meaning the motif or parts thereof have already been pre-stretched with the necessary threads, making them easier to embroider and giving opulent results.

The tapestry technique is still used on canvases today. Many modern as well as traditional patterns and motifs can be found in the most diverse of countries and cultures today. Other classic canvas techniques like latch hook are also widespread. More recent techniques, such as working the canvas

into pom-pom rugs or the use of "waste canvas," can also be found with artists, designers or do-it-yourselfers all over the world.

Nowadays, traditional tapestry is often supplemented by many other modern techniques.

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WHAT ARE CANVASES?

PROPERTIES & SPECIAL FEATURES

Canvases are open fabric meshes usually made of cotton. They form a woven basis for many embroidery and latch hook techniques. Canvas is usually covered with embroidery over its entire area. High-quality canvas makes it easier to embroider and makes the embroidery last longer – attention should always be paid to this when purchasing.

Canvas comes in different thicknesses: The number behind the slash after the item number indicates the numbers of stitches per 10 cm. Fine canvases with 26 to 70 stitches per 10 cm (6 - 18 ct.) are for cross-stitch, needlepoint, satin stitch and other stiches for counted embroidery; while coarse

canvases with 13 to 20 stiches per 10 cm (3 - 5 ct.) are for cross-stitch, satin stitch and latch hook. Canvas thickness, embroidery or latch hook threads as well as needle or latch hook must match the technique in question, so it is always a good idea to make a sample.

A special finish lends the fabric a firmness which makes it easier to embroider. Canvases from ZWEIGART® are woven from sturdy, evenly rounded multiple threads, heavily finished and feature a square and stitch-precise surface. All canvases are 100% made at the company's headquarters in Sindelfingen, Germany.

A BRIEF OVERVIEW OF CANVAS BINDINGS

There are three different kinds of canvas bindings. Each one has different properties and works especially well with specific embroidery or the latch hook techniques. These three bindings include mono canvas on one hand, and "twist canvas" as well as the double-threaded canvases on the other.

The canvas which is used depends on various factors, such as the embroidery technique or material used. Our canvases are often printed on by partners with a wide variety of motifs as a basic design for the embroidery. For exact prints on canvases a straight and square quality is essential.

Mono canvas is a single-threaded canvas. It is plain-woven, meaning that the vertical warp and horizontal weft move up and down and cross at the same distance – all openings between the threads are woven checkers. The mesh threads are stiffened with a finish in order to stay in shape.

Double-threaded canvases are also plain-woven, except the spaces between the mesh threads are not equal. Instead, it has two threads packed close together, forming a stable woven checker made up of two warp and two weft threads. With double-threaded canvas, the fineness is not indicated with the number of mesh threads, but with the number of woven checkers. The opening or puncture site between the woven checkers is large and simplifies counting and embroidering. It is a classic cloth for tapestry such as Gobelin embroidery. On double-threaded canvas, particularly fine pattern fields such as faces can only be embroidered using a single weaving thread, even with split or thinner thread, which means there isn't just one stitch for patterning at these places, but four.

Twist canvas is a special fabric in which two warp threads each turn around weft threads. It resembles the single-stranded canvas, but here the threads can not be moved due to the interlock/twist weave and result in a high surface stability.

CARE INSTRUCTIONS

If necessary canvases should only be carefully washed by hand / Dry cleaned after the embroidery is finished. The rigid finish oft he canvases will be lost when in contact with water — thus becoming much softer. Therefore the canvases are only to be washed after the embroidery is done. Hoewever when washing and ironing, care instructions of all embroidery materials — especially yarns — need to be taken into consideration. The canvas can be pulled back into a rectangular shape afterwards.


Canvas 500 is a **double-thread canvas** in white. It comes in eleven different fabric counts. Adjacent pairs of mesh threads result in a single stitch. The wide rage of counts mean that there is the right canvas for virtually any embroidery thread. This quality is the most widely used embroidery canvas.

USE & TECHNIQUES

Normally, this canvas is completely embroidered over in different techniques for pictures, cushions or similar. However, canvas 500 is also used as "waste canvas." This term is used because the individual threads of the canvas are given a special finish which dissolves in water. If the canvas is dampened with water, then the individual threads of the canvas will separate from one another and can be pulled out leaving only the embroidery. For that reason, the canvas can be used as an aid, especially when embroidering non-countable fabrics in cross-stitch. Further explanations on this technique can be found under the section "Further techniques – waste canvas."

YARNS & NEEDLES

These specifications are just rough reference values. For vivid and dark embroidery thread colours,



the canvas should be selected one number tighter, so that the thread covers it well. A coarser canvas can also be selected for a more transparent effect. In general, it is always recommended to test the yarn with a small sample on the canvas. With remaining threads of similar thickness, you can achieve additional effects, for instance by combining smooth, shiny or fluffy threads like patchwork to form a pattern-material mix.

The fabric of this canvas is marked with blue stripes at intervals of 5 stitches, which works as a counting aid, making it much easier to count out the lay out motifs. Canvas 510 is a very open, light meshwork fabric which retains its rigidity thanks to its stiff finish. It gives large-area embroidery the stability it needs. It also makes it easier for beginners to learn decorative embroidery techniques.

Canvas 510 is a **double-thread canvas** in white with blue lines. Adjacent pairs of mesh threads result in a single stitch. The blue thread woven in as a counting pattern makes it easier to cut to size with absolute precision, so that the fabric is easier to apply to the base at the right angle.

USE & TECHNIQUES

"Waste canvas" is another term which is used for canvas 510. This term is used because the individual threads of the canvas are given a special finish which dissolves in water. So if the canvas is dampened with water, then the individual threads of the canvas will separate from one another and can be pulled out leaving only the embroidery. For that reason, the canvas can be used as an aid, especially when embroidering non-countable fabrics in cross-stitch.

Further explanations on this technique can be found under "Further techniques – waste canvas." However, the canvas can also be fully embroidered as in needlepoint for pictures, cushions or similar.

YARNS & NEEDLES

These specifications are just rough reference values. For vivid and dark embroidery thread colours, the canvas should be selected one number tighter, so that the thread covers it well. A coarser canvas can also be selected for a more transparent effect. In general, it is always a recommended idea to test the yarn with a small sample on the canvas.

Canvas 504 is a very open, light meshwork fabric which retains its rigidity thanks to its stiff finish. It gives large-area embroidery the stability it needs. It also makes it easier for beginners to learn decorative stitching techniques.

Canvas 504 is a **double-thread canvas** in white. Adjacent pairs of mesh threads result in a single stitch. More material is used in this canvas, making it a bit more opulent than 500 canvas.

USE & TECHNIQUES

Canvas 504 is usually used for cross-stitch or half-stitch. This canvas is also often painted or printed on by partners.


Canvas 505 is a **double-thread canvas** in brown. Adjacent pairs of mesh threads result in a single stitch. This canvas is essentially the same as 504, but in an attractive antique colour.

USE & TECHNIQUES

The neutral shade of brown makes an ideal background for dark or colourful needlepoint, since it will not shine through in white, even if fine embroidery thread is used. Needlepoint, cross-stitch or half-stitch are most often used on this canvas.

Penelope is a **double-thread canvas** in brown. Adjacent pairs of mesh threads result in a single stitch. Fine pattern parts can also be embroidered with just a single weaving thread.


USE & TECHNIQUES

Penelope canvas is especially recommended for high-grade tapestries, furniture covers, purses and many other useful items, and is embroidered with cross- and half-stitches.



It is plain-woven, meaning that the vertical warp and horizontal weft move up and down and cross at the same distance – all openings between the threads are woven checkers. The canvas is stiffened by a rigid finish and thus maintains its shape.

USE & TECHNIQUES

This fabric is often used as a training material for people's first tries at embroidery. It is suitable for petit point with embroidery thread or for long-stitch/satin stitch with mercerized yarn.

This canvas is suitable for long-stitch, satin stitch and various other surface-filling types of embroidery (needlepoint). In the USA, on the other hand, this canvas is often painted by hand and sometimes not embroidered over its whole surface.





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EMBROIDERY TECHNIQUES

KEY INFO ON THE TECHNIQUES

Not only do classic Gobelins in half-stitch or cross-stitch work well on canvas, the material is also great for special textural variations with various fills. The stitches span over multiple bars, making the embroidery work go quite quickly.

The canvas is embroidered over completely for cushions and other useful items, while unembroidered

With canvas, "bars" refer to the threads which separate each of the holes in the meshwork from one another. A bar may be made up of a different number of mesh threads depending on the quality of the canvas.

fabric meshes give an additional effect for partly transparent images. In this case, however, special attention must be paid when sewing up the threads to make sure that the ends are sewn in the correct direction of stitching. It is generally important with all single-sided stitches to make sure that all of the stitches are going in the same direction. Furthermore, it is important to make

sure that the thread is not too long in order to ensure an even embroidery pattern (approx. 50-70 cm). Wool in particular roughens up as the number of stitches increases, making it thinner so that it no longer covers up very well. A short thread will stop this — but it means there will also be more sewing work. It is generally recommended to use a special embroidery frame for canvases to ensure a good result. This not only makes the embroidery work quicker and more convenient, it also reduces

the risk of the canvas getting damp and wrinkling from being held by hand. But if the canvas is held still by hand while embroidering, it can be rolled up and held tight in the left hand.

A sample should always be worked before embroidering the canvas.

The choice of material can have a big effect on the result of the work. For that reason, it is always a good idea to make a test sample before beginning in order to see whether the canvas and embroidery

thread work well together. After the embroidering, the canvas must no longer be visible between the stitches. If it is, then the embroidery thread is too thin in proportion to the canvas. If the ratio is not correct, then a coarser or finer canvas should be used instead of thicker or thinner thread.

The classic and mostly widely used stiches for canvas embroidery are half-stitch, underlaid half-stitch, gobelin stitch and diagonal stitch. However, any other filling decorative stitch can be used to embroider on canvas. Interesting patterns are not only created through a variety of colours, but also by different embroidery textures.


Canvases can also be worked on using completely different techniques. Latch hook is one of the most famous examples. This technique is primarily used for making rugs and cushions. Uncountable fabrics can also be embroidered with beautiful cross-stitch on selected canvases known as "waste canvases" (such as items 500 and 510). Pom-pom technique is also suitable for beginners in order to make nice rugs and cushions quickly and easily.

Except for "waste canvases" used for embroidering non-countable fabrics, embroidery on canvas is generally done with blunt needles. For that reason, pay attention when selecting the needle to make sure it goes through the canvas straight and that the needle has an eye that's big enough for the embroidery material to be used.

HALF-STITCH · SIMPLE GOBELIN STITCH

With simple Gobelin, the direction of stitching runs from the bottom left to the top right. A vertical stitch will form on the back side. Unfortunately, this type of embroidery tends to pull the meshwork from the right angle. This makes it important to keep the finished piece under tension in a frame, especially when embroidering firmly and tightly.



UNDERLAID HALF-STITCH

If the thread doesn't cover completely, but its colour would fit quite nicely, then it is possible to first stretch a stitch in the desired colour with the thread diagonally over the holes in the canvas to be embroidered. Then insert the needle between the double groups in the meshwork and make a halfstitch over it from the bottom left to the top right.

This allows you to sketch out fields of colour with the thread.





The two mesh threads of a double-threaded canvas are referred to as double groups. With an underlaid half-stitch, the needle is not inserted through the holes in the mesh like usual, but between the two mesh threads of the bar. With canvas, "bars" refer to the threads which separate each of the holes in the meshwork from one another – in the case of a double-threaded canvas, these are, as the name implies, two threads.


This makes the stitches fuller so that the canvas is completely covered by the stitches. The embroidery looks more opulent than with half-stitch, but it also uses more thread. Unfortunately, this type of embroidery tends to pull the meshwork from the right angle. This makes it important to keep the finished piece under tension in a frame, especially when embroidering firmly and tightly.


With "traced" canvases, this work is already done in advance and the pattern is already preembroidered with the cross-stitches - this means that with traced canvases, only a half-stitch still has to be embroidered. These usually come in very high-class embroidery packs which are mainly available in France. These packs are very expensive, since the preliminary work has to be done by hand.

GOBELIN STITCH

On the top side, this stitch looks like a half-stitch, while on the bottom side, the thread runs diagonally over two mesh chequers. As the name implies, this yields a very beautiful, pearly surface. However, this stitch also uses more thread than half-stitch.

Unfortunately, this type of embroidery tends to pull the meshwork from the right angle. This makes it





important to keep the finished piece under tension in a frame, especially when embroidering firmly and tightly. With large areas in particular, it is better to embroider the canvas in diagonal gobelin stitch, in which the meshwork does not warp and the finished embroidery cannot get out of shape again.


If the Gobelin stitch is embroidered on double-threaded canvas, then the mesh and the embroidery thread are divided for faces and parts of the motif which require very fine detail work. This is called "petit point."


DIAMOND STITCH

First make a cross-stitch over four bars and then make a vertical cross over it. Stitch in and out in the order of the numbers. The last stitch must always be crosswise, so that the embroidery pattern will be uniform. The next diamond stitch connects up to it directly.

This stitch does not cover up the canvas completely, making it suitable for transparent effects.

DOUBLE DIAMOND STITCH


The instructions show a single stitch in its four phases of work.

The double diamond stitch is made up of eight overlying partial-stitches and is magnified here so that the direction of stitching can be seen more clearly. Stitch in and out in the order of the numbers. Make sure the last stitch is always vertical. Like with diamond stitch, work the squares closely together in continuous rows. The stitch covers the canvas completely and bulges upwards vividly at the centre point.

The double diamond stitch stands out thanks to its particularly distinctive texture. It can be used quite well as an individual decorative stitch. However, if it is embroidered continuously, the threads would run horizontally from 16 to 1. These would cause the stitch to shift over time.




CROSS-STITCH

In cross-stitch, the base stitches are embroidered like half-stitches until the colour changes. Then a back-row is made crossing back over it.

The cross-stitch is the most famous embroidery stitching technique in the world when it comes to countable embroidery.








CHESSBOARD STITCH

In this stitch, diagonally pierced staying stitches are made continuously over 1-5 bar crossings and then back again. This will form a square. Next to it comes the next square with the thread running in the opposite direction. Start at the dot – this is the first exit point. The arrow points in the direction of the entry points. Work the squares in rows from left to right and each second row from right to left. Either single-threaded canvas or twist canvas can be used for this embroidery technique.








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DIAGONAL STITCH BASKET STITCH

This stitch is embroidered in diagonal stitches. Embroider crosswise on the back side going up and vertically going down, passing over two chequers in the mesh. This will form a woven pattern on the back side. This stitch is primarily intended for filling out backgrounds. The advantage of this stitch is that the diagonal stitch does not shift the embroidery out of the right angle.






VERTICAL KELIM STITCH

In the ascending row, the stitches are pointed upwards, while the ones in the descended row point downwards. Always embroider over a woven cross on the back side. All fields are filled with this stitch. The kelim stitch is also known as a braid stitch and can be used to fasten the edges for knotted carpets.









In the rows pointing left, the stitches on the back are always embroidered from top right to bottom left over a woven cross. In the row pointing right, all of the backwards stitches run from the top left to the bottom right. This stitch is used to make diagonal contours.








HORIZONTAL KELIM STITCH

The stitches on the back side run diagonally over two woven chequers (zig-zag stitch). This stitch is suitable for horizontal contours. The kelim stitch is also known as a braid stitch and can be used to fasten the edges for knotted carpets.







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MOSAIC STITCH

First, make the diamonds out of vertical staying stitches over the entire embroidered area. Then make the diagonal staying stitches. This will cover up the entry and exit points of the diamonds. Either mono canvas or twist canvas can be used.










RIGHT FISHBONE DIAGONAL

First, make a row of vertical staying stitches over four bars. After that, embroider staying stitches crossing each other diagonally. It's best to start at the point with the long diagonal. Shorten each of the stitches at the corners and edges.

First, all of the staying stitch base rows can be embroidered over the entire field with a spacing of two bars each, and the crossing rows of stitches can be added in the second step.








LEFT FISHBONE DIAGONAL

First, embroider the crosswise staying stitches over the four bars. Then comes the vertical row crossing over them. It is best to start with a long diagonal in order to practice the rhythm of this stitch. The corners will then emerge on their own.

First, all of the staying stitch base rows can be embroidered over the entire field with a spacing of two bars each, and the crossing rows of stitches can be added in the second step.

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OTHER TECHNIQUES

LATCH HOOK

Latch hook can be done either with "Ghiordes" knots or with loop knots. With a Ghiordes knot, the knot pile is taller, but the pattern is not emphasised so heavily. Loop knots yield a base mesh which is filled more tightly, making the pattern more clearly highlighted thanks to a shorter pile.

Both types of knots are made in cross-rows according to the pre-printed pattern. Start at the bottom left corner of the design and work in complete rows from left to right and from bottom to top. When

doing so, it is important to always knot over the double, horizontal cross-threads of the canvas and not over the vertical twisted threads. The first knot should start three stitches away from the edge, turned inwards.

These three rows are needed for the serged carpet seam, which ends up being worked over the turned-in canvas edge. The meshwork should be weighted down during latch hook so that it cannot slip, and it's best to work at the edge of a table. This makes it easier to insert the latch hook.

Smyrna canvas (820/130) is usually used to produce a thick carpet quality. In order to get the best result on this canvas, knot with either Smyrna wool, carpet wool or double-threaded Rya wool.

Smyrna canvas, fine Smyrna and ZWEIGART
Twist are most suitable for knotted carpets.

Fine Smyrna (955/180) knotted on with fine carpet wool or acrylic thread is recommended for a finer quality. ZWEIGART Twists (9106, 9116, 1136 or 9118) are another option for latch hook. This canvas es are knotted on with carpet wool or acrylic thread.

LOOP KNOTS

Lay a piece of wool with equally long ends around the latch hook. Hold both ends firmly and slide the latch hook flat under the paired cross-bar of the canvas until the small hinged hook makes its way through as well.

Turn the latch hook upwards slightly and pull it back until the small hinged hook lifts up. Now, place the wool ends loosely into the open hook.

Turn the latch hook back flat and pull it backwards. This will close the small hinged hook and the knot will form automatically. Hold the base mesh firmly while pulling back.








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GHIORDES KNOT

First, pierce the latch hook through beneath the bottom thread of the paired cross-bar until the hinged hook has made its way through as well. Then place a piece of wool into the open hook. Hold one wool end firmly and pull the other one downwards and through.

The wool end being held, which protrudes outwards between the bar pair, is shorter and bent downwards for the next step in the work. Pierce the latch hook through beneath the upper cross-bar. Place the longer wool end into the open hook and pull it downwards. The small hinged hook will close in the process. Pull the knot tight with ends of equal length.







EDGE FASTENINGS

There are several ways to fasten the edge of knotted carpets or wall hangings. The choice depends on the desired appearance.

Turnover right at the knotted edge

There are four different ways to make this type of edge fastening. First, the knotted edge can be sewn with tight herringbone stitches.


Another possibility is to finish the knotted edge with carpet tape. The best result is achieved with a carpet tape 5 - 6 cm (2 - 2.5") wide. Sew one edge of the tape to the outer edge of the canvas with sewing stitches, making sure to catch only the canvas in the process. Once the inside edge of the tape is firmly connected to the back side of the canvas, then the sewing work is complete. Keep pulling the textile tape smooth while sowing and make small folds where necessary. The third method is a


self-adhesive textile tape. After latch hook, cut the protruding edges of the canvas to size. While doing so, carefully follow the shape of the design and keep a distance of at least 5 - 6 cm (2 - 2.5") to the knotted surface, or a bit more than the width of the self-adhesive textile tape. Fold the canvas edge onto the back side and fasten it with small sewing stitches. Make sure to fasten the sewing stitches in the canvas – not the knots. With shaped carpets, gradually fold the protruding edge loosely onto the back side. Lining is the fourth possibility.

Visible bordering

Serging with overedging satin stitches is one possibility. To do so, turn over the canvas two stitches away from the knotted edge and serge it tightly over the doubled canvas.

With a double-threaded canvas, serge between the paired groups of threads as well. With a twist canvas, pierce into the large holes twice.






The bordering can also be done with a braid stitch. To do so, turn over the canvas two stitches away from the knotted edge and work the braid stitch in back-and-forth stiches over the doubled canvas.

The canvas edge can also be crochet around or sewn around with wood edging.







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WASTE CANVAS

Waste canvas can be used to embroider non-countable fabrics such as clothing, bags, etc. with cross-stitch patterns. The term "waste canvas" is used because the individual threads of the canvas are given a special finish which dissolves in water. So if the canvas is dampened with water, then the individual threads of the canvas will separate from one another.

500 and 510 are canvases which can be used for this. These come in various numbers of stitches from 2.6 to 7 stitches (7ct. to 18 ct.), so that the size of the cross-stitches – and thus the size of the embroidered motif – can be determined yourself.

For the specific execution, cut the canvas 8 to 10 cm larger than the embroidered motif and staple it to the fabric. Once the motif has been fully embroidered, moisten the embroidery with a bit of water and use tweezers or similar to pull the canvas out of the embroidery thread by thread. This way, you can cleanly embroider a motif made with cross-stitching onto a non-countable fabric.

Waste canvas is a counting pattern for embroidering non-countable fabrics.

The canvas is completely removed after embroidery.

embroidery. The number of the threads used depends on the number of stitches of the canvas used. The finer the canvas, the fewer threads are used when embroidering.

Even though blunt needles are typically used for cross-stitch embroidery, pointy needles are

a good idea when using waste canvas. This is because most fabrics embroidered in this case have a

much tighter meshwork than normal evenweave fabrics, such as denim, jersey or other cotton fabrics.

Waste canvas makes it easy to individualise garments, bags, etc. and make real highlights out of them. In particular, the recent trend of "upcycling" shows that little highlights can be used to take old articles from the closet and make them fit for everyday use again. Beginners can get good results with this canvas too – and quickly.

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POM-POM TECHNIQUE

Our canvases can be used not only to conjure up beautiful knotted carpets, but also as the basis for pom-pom rugs. Zweigart Twist (item no. 9699) is usually used for this. The pom-poms are easy to fasten to the canvas through the holes in the meshwork, making for quick success. Moreover, the twisted mesh threads make this canvas very sturdy, and it can be cut into any desired shape.

Many different kinds of wool yarn can be used for the pom-pom technique. Results turn out best when acrylic thread is used, because it makes the pom-poms nice and fluffy. How much wool is needed always depends on the thickness of the wool yarn and the tightness of the technique for winding the pom-poms. Prym offers a great set for this, which makes it easy as pie to wind the pom-poms very quickly.

The same edge fastenings as for the latch hook technique can be used to finish the rug. A clean closure is nicest and easiest to make with bias binding in a colour which goes well with the wool yarn used. The pom-poms can be fastened with either a large needle or a latch hook hook. But it's also easy to do with a regular hair clip. To do so, simply take the two threads protruding from the pom-pom and clamp them in the hair needle and then pull the hair needle through the two threads in the canvas.







Then wrap the threads around the pom-pom and tie the threads tightly with a double-knot. When doing so, pay attention to make sure that the pom-pom is seated closely to the canvas after being knotted, instead of dangling loosely. The threads can then be cut off with a bit of distance to the knot. After that, fasten all of the pom-poms with to the canvas with a spacing of 3-6 cm. This will make the canvas look very neat and tidy from behind.

When using pom-poms in different colours, it is recommended to consider the pattern in which the pom-poms are later to be arranged on the canvas and capture it with a photo before starting to fasten the pom-poms to the canvas. This will make it easy to distribute the pom-poms as planned.

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KEYWORD INDEX

Finish

A necessary finish lends the fabric a firmness which makes it easier to embroider. With ZWEIGART® canvases such as waste canvas.

Binding

Crossing of threads done according to specific rules is referred to as binding. The number of warp and weft threads and the tightness and looseness of the yarns are the decisive factors for the quality of a fabric or canvas.

Twist canvas

This canvas is a special fabric in which two warp threads each turn around weft threads. It resembles the single-stranded canvas, but here the threads can not be moved due to the leno weave and result in a high surface stability.

Counted embroidery

Counted embroidery is a form of embroidery in which a specific number of mesh threads or thread groups is embroidered following the course of the thread.

Woven chequers

The arrangement of warp and weft threads which form a visible group in the meshwork is revered to as woven chequers.

Mono canvas

It is a single-threaded canvas. It is plain-woven, meaning that the vertical warp and horizontal weft move up and down and cross at the same distance – all openings between the threads are woven checkers. The mesh threads are stiffened with a finish so that they stay in shape.

Bars

With canvas, "bars" refer to the threads which separate each of the holes in the meshwork from one another. A bar may be made up of a different number of mesh threads depending on the quality of the canvas. With mono canvas, a bar consists of just a single weaving thread. With double-threaded

canvas, a bar is made up of two mesh threads. With twist canvases, a bar is also made up of two mesh threads, one of which is in twisted form.

Stitch

There are countless different stitches in embroidery. The embroidery stitch to be used is selected depending on the desired appearance and the chosen mesh.

Tapestry technique

A characteristic feature of tapestry is that it is embroidered on canvas. In the process, the canvas is completely covered by embroidery stitches, meaning that both the motif and the background are embroidered on. It is one of the oldest embroidery techniques, widespread for centuries throughout the world, including Asia, Southern Europe, France, England and Greece.

Tracing

Patterns are pre-tensioned in colour between the two closely-packed mesh threads and then embroidered over. On double-threaded canvas, particularly fine pattern fields such as faces can only be embroidered using a single weaving thread, even with split or thinner thread, which means there isn't just one stitch for patterning at these places, but four.

Waste canvas

Waste canvas can be used to embroider non-countable fabrics such as clothing, bags, etc. with cross-stitch patterns. The term "waste canvas" is used because the individual threads of the canvas are given a special finish which dissolves in water. So if the canvas is dampened with water, then the individual threads of the canvas will separate from one another. 500 and 510 are canvases which can be used for this.

Double-threaded canvases

These canvases are plain-woven, except the spaces between the mesh threads are not equal. Instead, it has two threads packed close together, forming a stable woven checker made up of two warp and two weft threads. With double-threaded canvas, the fineness is not indicated with the number of mesh threads, but with the number of woven checkers. The opening or puncture site between the woven checkers is large and simplifies counting and embroidering.
